## IJFE REFLECTIONS

Thelma Pickens Clark was born on October 6, 1920, in Ozan, Arkansas, to Seneca and Lou Myrt Pickens. She was the youngest of four siblings, with three brothers—H.T, Monte, and Cleo—and one sister, Mel. Thelma's mother passed away when she was just 12 years old, and she was sent to live with her Uncle Andy and Aunt Nettie Pickens, who raised her as their own, along with their children.

Thelma attended elementary school in Ozan and graduated from Yeager High School in Hope, Arkansas. After high school, she moved to Poplar Bluff, Missouri, to continue her education, but fate intervened when she met and fell in love with L.E. (Lee) Clark. They were married in November 1939, and from their union, two daughters were born: Mildred Lee and Myrtle. Myrtle preceded her in death in 2010.

In 1943, Thelma and Lee moved to Chicago to seek greater opportunities and education for their daughters. Upon arriving in Chicago, Thelma quickly united with Southwestern Baptist Church under the leadership of Reverend B.H. January, becoming an active and devoted member of the Usher Board.

In Chicago, Thelma found employment in several positions before securing a role with the Kitchens of Sara Lee on Elston Avenue, where she was one of the original bakers. And yes, she could make a mean pound cake! She remained at Sara Lee until 1971, and it was there that she developed her keen interest in financial planning. Having been gifted with several shares of Sara Lee stock by the company's founder, Charles Lubin, Thelma continued to expand her portfolio over the years, including stock in Sears; where she worked part-time after leaving Sara Lee and moving to Libertyville, IL. Her financial wisdom became a cornerstone of her life, and she made sure to pass that knowledge on to her children and grandchildren, teaching them the importance of "paying what [you] owe" and being financially responsible.

Around this same time, Lee's work as a private chauffeur allowed them to adopt the snowbird lifestyle of wintering in Key Biscayne, Florida. This pattern of traveling south during the winter months and returning to Chicago after Easter became their norm for many years. Thelma loved their time in Florida, and she would look forward to the long drive down, stops along the way, enjoying the warmer weather and a relaxed pace of life.

Thelma was also known for her love of fashion, shopping, and traveling. She was always impeccably dressed and enjoyed attending fashion shows such as the annual Ebony Fashion Fair and other social events. She was a devoted mother and an indulgent grandmother, often taking her grandchildren on trips across the country to places like Washington, D.C., Canada, California, and of course, back to Ozan, Arkansas to name a few. Her trips to visit family in "the Harbor" East Chicago, Indiana, and daily phone calls with her cousin, Florida were among her favorite pastimes, as was spending time with her beloved sister-in-law, Bessie Clark.

In her spare time, Thelma enjoyed quilting, embroidering, and playing card games like Bid-whist, Pity Pat and Keno. She was also a lover of music and maintained an impressive collection of 33rpm and 78rpm records, which filled her home with the sounds of yesteryear. Throughout her life, Thelma remained devoted to her church. She served Southwestern Baptist Church, now Miracle House of Prayer, faithfully for decades, under the leadership of five pastors. Her passion for the ministry and the church's vision was evident in her tireless efforts, whether selling banquet tickets, chicken dinners, hosting teas, or helping to raise funds for the building of the new church home. In her final role at the church, she served on the Mothers Board. Her dedication to her faith and community was unwavering, and she remained a pillar of strength for the congregation.

In 2016, at the age of 96, Thelma became a resident of Avantara of Evergreen Park. Though her ability to attend church services became limited, she continued to live with a vibrant spirit. Always determined to stay active, Thelma wheeled herself around the facility daily, visiting with other residents and attending her favorite Thursday Bingo games and beauty shop appointments, which were coordinated by special staff member and friend, Adrianne. Her sharp mind and strong will remained intact, and she took great joy in spending time with family and seeing her loved ones.

After Lee's passing in 1995, Thelma often spoke of the deep love she had for him and how much she missed him. Their marriage lasted 56 years, and she cherished every moment they shared together. They truly had a wonderful life.

Thelma leaves a legacy that spans five generations, including her daughter, Mildred Lee Washington; five grandchildren: Dr. JaTonya (Toni) Harris (Mark Sr.), Kimberly Robinson (Orlando), Dion Washington (Angie), Dr. Laron Washington, and Jennifer Lamptey (Prince pid); as well as 13 greatgrandchildren, six great-great-grandchildren, and many nieces, nephews, cousins, and friends. She was also blessed by the kindness and frequent visits of Brother Tommie Little (Dorothy), a devoted member of her church, who often brought gifts and flowers during her later years.


