

MORNING LIGHT

Curtiss Ephraim Crossley, Sr. was born on May 11, 1936 in Amite County, Mississippi. He was the third of four children born to Roosevelt and Angeline (Green) Crossley. He was preceded in death by his parents and all of his siblings (Samuel Crossley, Annie Ruth Crossley, and Laura Crossley).

KNOWLEDGE IS POWER

He spent his early school years in the Summit (Amite County), Mississippi school districts. It was during his secondary education at DuSable High School, in Chicago, Illinois, that Curtiss first enlisted in the United States Army in 1952. As a member of DuSable's Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC), Curtiss achieved the rank of Captain during his junior year in 1953. In 1954, Major Curtiss Crossley distinguished himself as one of twelve recipients of The Honorary Brevet Commission. This honor was only given to the most outstanding graduating cadet officers. He also shined as a member of the ROTC Sabre Team, and as one of the five young marksmen of the school's Rifle Team. He completed his post-secondary education at Chicago State University, where he received a B.S. in Education with a Minor in Mathematics; and at Governors State University, where he received a M.A. in Psychology and Counseling.

SERVICE TO COUNTRY

Being the brilliant leader that he was, Curtiss experienced an extraordinary rise in rank from Major to II Lieutenant (1958), to I Lieutenant (1961), and finally, Lieutenant Colonel (1968). At the time, the appointment of a Black man to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in the United States Army was rare. After a storied, active duty military career, Lieutenant Colonel Curtiss E. Crossley subsequently served in the Illinois Army National Guard. He received an Honorable Discharge from The United States Army in 1968.

LOVE AND LEGACY

Curtiss met the love of his life, Jane Alice Adams while attending Chicago State University (formerly Chicago Teachers College). They were married on February 1, 1970. To this union two brilliant young Black Kings were born, Curtiss Ephraim II and Cornelius Efraim, Sr.

VOCATION OF DISTINCTION

True to his calling as a leader and griot, Curtiss held career teaching positions such as Adjunct Professor and Human Resource Specialist at University of Illinois at Chicago, Adjunct Professor at South Suburban College, Adjunct Professor at Prairie State College, Elementary School Math Teacher at School District 152, Traffic Safety Instructor at Northwestern University, Student Specialist at South Suburban College, Office Assistant for the Transitional Work Program at Hines VA Hospital, and providing more than 20 years of individual tutoring in Mathematics.

A SURE FOUNDATION

Always possessing a servant's heart, Curtiss was saved prior to meeting his future bride. After they married, his commitment to family unity caused him to change his church affiliation and become a member of Harvey Church of God In Christ, under the leadership of the late Elder Andrew Williams. Here, he faithfully served on the Usher Board and in whatever capacity needed. Along with his family, he later became one of the founding members of the Abounding Life COGIC, under the leadership of his brother-in-law, the late Elder James R. Adams. At Abounding Life, he worked diligently for many years as Head of The Usher Board. His white-gloved, gentle, but firm handshake and friendly smile greeted countless members and visitors each week! Curtiss also faithfully sang in the Abounding Life Men's Choir. He will be fondly remembered for making sure that everyone received their braided "palm branch" on Palm Sunday. One of his last spiritual achievements happened on Sunday, April 28, 2024 when he was officially ordained as a Deacon of Abounding Life by Bishop Ocie Booker, Pastor of Abounding Life COGIC.

RISE UP EVEN HIGHER

Lieutenant Colonel Curtiss E. Crossley, Sr. departed this earthly life on Saturday, June 8, 2024.
